> On Christmas Day tragedy struck when 88 year old Jennie Mae Lynn Úmstattd suffered a serious stroke. She was quickly taken to Saint Luke's East. When she had first arrived, her speech had suffered greatly. She lost the use of her right arm and leg. At her age there was the concern that she would not be able to regain mobility. Shortly after she transported to Serenity Rehabilitation and Nursing which is a local facility. Community Mourns Fallen Officer

Clinton, Missouri Police Officer Ryan Morton, 30, was shot and killed while responding to a 911 call with two other officers Tuesday night. He had just returned to full-time duty to replace a recently fallen officer in his department, officials said. Morton joined the Army National Guard in November 2005. He had been with the Clinton Police Department from February 2015 to January 2017. He stayed on as a reserve officer, but returned to full-time duty in the summer after fellow



Officer Gary Michael was shot and killed during a traffic stop in August. Morton was fatally shot, while the two other officers, who were not identified, were wounded and taken to the hospital.

"Clinton, MO, Police Officer Christopher Ryan Morton, served with distinction for the citizens of Clinton as a full-time Police Officer from 2/12/2015 until 1/10/2017. He stayed with the department as reserve officer until he returned again to full time duty 9/24/2017. #ClintonPD," Missouri State Highway Patrol tweeted.






